We all forget at times that we were created to be human beings, not human doings. So, grab a cup of coffee and a cookie and read on to see what you need to be aware of this August.

3 For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven:

<sup>2</sup> a time to be born and a time to die;

a time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted;

One of the things I miss about my childhood is harvest time. I lived in western Kansas. Wheat, corn silage, and milo was mainly what we harvested to be put in the bins or silo. Most of which we raised we fed to our cattle. That was some of the hardest work I've done physically, but with the greatest of its own rewards. There is nothing to me like the wide-open spaces. Hot, dry, cold, windy. How could you want anything more?

The writer of Ecclesiastes - believed to be King Solomon - tells us in this famous passage that there are times and seasons in life. One of those is a time to plant and a time to reap (or harvest). And just like in agriculture, so too in the ministry of the church, there is a time to sow and a time to reap. Our "crop" is souls - making disciples as Jesus commanded us to do in Matthew 28. We do a lot of sowing into people's lives, don't we ... either in terms of sharing the gospel (evangelism) or teaching and guiding people in the Christian life (discipleship). But there are times when I get frustrated that we seem to sow a lot, but not see a lot of harvesting. Perhaps, that is a matter of prayer – do we pray and ask God that we see a harvest of souls – people coming to faith? We live in difficult times, where the "soil" of people's lives is hard, dry, and cracked, and if you know anything about gardening, you'll know that hard and dry soil isn't a good seedbed for growth! Part of the reason for this is that people's hearts have grown cold and distant to religion and faith. The advancements in technology have made the world a much smaller place and now we see not just our own struggles, but the global struggles of life. As such, people cannot see God, or would even question that if there is a God of love, why does He allow so much pain and hurt to continue? (The answer for that is easier than you might think but wouldn't necessarily satisfy the non-believer's question). So, I believe we need to be praying on multiple levels because clearly, the Bible teaches about the sowing of the gospel into people's lives and the discipleship of those who believe in Jesus Christ. Our words are empty and powerless unless God provides the power behind them. Only God can truly convict the heart and challenge the soul. We don't make people Christians – He does that work. So, let's PRAY that: • The "soil" of the non-believers' hearts is revitalized and nourished by the Holy Spirit • That opportunities to sow the seed of the gospel are presented in greater abundance. • That hearers of the gospel more readily accept the message without question (or too many questions!) Blessings, \* That those coming to faith, and those already in the faith, have a heartfelt desire to learn and journey with Jesus so that fruit is seen in their lives.

Thank you to everyone who gives financially into the life of the church. Did you realize that the money you give is actually not yours, but God's? In the Old Testament, God required the Israelites to give a tenth of their first fruits (first income) to the Storehouse, which is now the church. Of course, we are no longer under the Old Testament Law, but as Jesus demonstrated it is not about just a tenth (though that is still a useful guide and baseline), now it is about sacrificial giving – just as Jesus sacrificially gave His very life for our freedom. Giving is something that should come naturally and joyfully to the Christian. If you don't give, why not try, and see how God provides and blesses you. AND FINALLY Wishing you every blessing for the remainder of this month and into the new month. If you can, take time to slow down, perhaps do something different, and seek refreshment. And don't forget to keep your eye out for where God might be wanting to use you to speak hope and truth into people's lives.
